



Car Battery Keeps Dying — What It Usually Is

How real visits for a battery that keeps dying ended at independent shops across the US — the part actually replaced, how often, and what it cost when it was the only fix.

WHICH ONE IS YOURS? LISTEN FIRST

- **Slow crank on cold mornings** — Batteries announce retirement with slow, laboring cranks — most last 3–5 years, less in heat.
- **Battery light while driving** — The battery warning light means the alternator isn't charging — the car is running down its battery in real time.
- **Dead after sitting a few days** — A healthy car sleeps at a trickle.

WHAT TO EXPECT FROM THE SHOP

Expect a battery and charging-system test first — it separates a tired battery from a failing alternator. If both test good, the shop hunts a parasitic draw, and that is real diagnosis time. A battery replaced without the test is the most common wasted repair on this list.
