Low / typical / high are computed per line, so they don't add up exactly to the totals — the total row is the real distribution of complete invoices.

IS YOUR QUOTE FAIR?

A quote between **\$156 and \$1,118** is inside the band where half of all Ford F-150 TPMS sensor replacements landed. Below it is not automatically a bargain (one sensor, quick-relearn vehicle); above it is not automatically gouging (all four sensors, OEM parts, a scan-tool relearn) — but both ends deserve a question.

WHAT MOVES THE PRICE

- **One or four** — sensors age together; many owners replace all four once one dies.
- **Relearn** — some vehicles relearn by driving; others need a tool and time.
- **Tire work** — each sensor means dismounting and rebalancing that tire.

Vehicle **Ford F-150, model years 1969–2025**
Data confidence **High** — *large sample, stable ranges*
Records through **July 2026**, refreshed continuously
Source **paid invoices from independent US repair shops**

Bring it to the shop. Ask for the written estimate split into parts, labor hours and rate, and fees — then compare each line. A shop that explains a number above the range is doing its job; one that won't is telling you something too.

NOT A QUOTE This report describes what other owners paid for the same repair. Your year, engine, region and the parts chosen shift the number. FixDozer does not perform repairs and receives nothing from shops.

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
